Youth 2 Youth Dialogue (Y 2 Y Dialogue)

The Y 2 Y dialogue program kicked off well on 18th July at the Kenya assemblies of God church in Subukia. Some Thirty energetic and eager young people availed themselves for this debut session.

This new program aims at opening a topic of discussion between groups of young people after choosing a topic. It enables them to learn from each other and realize that indeed solutions to problems are just within our reach.

The group was in favor of relationship matters over drugs abuse. It was our intention to cover relationships in general but that of boy/ girl relationship became dominant. It was the impression of the young people that we were professional counselors and thus expected ready answers to their problems as experienced elsewhere. But we had to make them realize that there is great help got through *sharing our personal life experiences*.

Much of the days' discussion were based on the theme 'it's not what Kenya can do for me but what I can do for Kenya'

The issue of young people getting engaged in alcoholism and drugs was also a major concern to many. This is something that is creeping in slowly and destroying the lives of many young people with great potentials. That church, where the session took place, is also coincidentally located at a place with a long line of bars selling cheap liquor!

'We have to stand up courageously and take action', one member summarized. The entire team had one conclusion after the meeting – it begins with me

Caux, Switzerland Experiences

Nelly was part of the Caux Scholars programme which took place as from 5 July - 4 August, 2010. She and Ann Njeri were also privileged to take part in the Leading Change for a Sustainable World conference on 4-10 August. They share their experience with us;

Nelly Njoki: 'The Leading Change for a Sustainable world was innovative and unique both in terms of content and methodology which met my expectation of building networks, getting a fresh vision and commitment for change. The link between poverty and environmental degradation was well illustrated and coupled with the leadership skills delivered helped me identify my role in contributing to a sustainable world in Kenya. I took back with me knowledge, new ideas, networks, personal transformation and a sense of responsibility in tackling poverty in Kenya. This I will do through sharing

lessons learnt with IOFC Kenya and identifying an activity we can embark on. The trust building and creators of peace sessions were very relevant to my work in Kenya.

I will conduct sessions on the same within my organization and the community leaders that I work with in order to heal the divisions among Kenya's ethnic communities.'

Ann Njeri: I was fortunate to be part of the 'Leading Change for a Sustainable World' conference at Caux. There were talks, brainstorms and sharing from environmental sustainability, awakening the responsible leader within to building sustainable trust.

There are many people and insights that inspired me, but on top of my list is two questions that were shared by one of the speakers on building trust 'What do we need to hear from the other group in order to begin to build trust? ... What are we doing in our group that perpetuates the problem?' These questions really got into my minds. I come from a region which has two major tribes that have been fighting in the crudest manner possible causing a lot of pain and

or death. My family have suffered the tribal clashes in



the past, it was clear in my heart that there are a few things I would like to hear from people from the other tribe. And I would also like to know what they would like to hear from my tribe so that sustainable trust and peace can be built in the region. If these questions are honestly and genuinely reflected upon and answered by the rival tribes, I feel, it might open grounds of building sustainable trust not just between groups but also in homes.
